

Introduction: In the early spring of 2005 West Felton Parish Council arranged an open Parish Meeting to judge whether there was enough support for a Parish Plan. Caroline Oakes from the Community Council came along to explain what a Parish Plan was, how it could be put together and the benefits to West Felton.

At that meeting volunteers came forward who wanted to be involved in the setting up of a committee, compiling a questionnaire, analysing the survey results and finally presenting to the village and statutory authorities our Parish Plan which contained the views and concerns of the people of West Felton.

A brief history of the parish: West Felton is mentioned in the Domesday Book as being held by Rainald the Sheriff from Roger, Earl of Shrewsbury. At that time it was a border village with a small motte and bailey castle to the west of the parish church. The remains of the mound can still be seen off the back lane to Manor Farm, but there is earlier aerial evidence of Saxon habitation; the high ground that West Felton holds was good defensive territory. Possibly the Romans were here before the Saxons; the copper mine at Lane End may have been first worked by them. There is in fact evidence of human habitation here for at least 2000 years.

Agriculture has always played a major part in the life of the people who lived here, as it still does, giving the rural environment that people value so highly today. In addition to agriculture, West Felton has, in the past, also had small industries, such as the glassworks at Queens Head and the boneworks at Rednal. The Holyhead Road (A5) that ran through the village was a major coaching road and it is no co-incidence that our pubs, including The Plough were all sited alongside.

Later transport methods include the canal (transporting both people and goods) and the railway. And during the last World War there was an airfield, at Rednal, which trained RAF pilots and wounded personnel were brought to several hospitals in the region.

In the latter part of the nineteenth and early twentieth century the village would have been self sufficient. What people didn't grow or raise for themselves would have been brought into the village general shop either by canal, rail or horse and cart. There were also butchers, cobblers, blacksmiths, seamstresses, farriers – all making for a self contained community.

Geographical and physical make up of the parish: Geographically, West Felton is situated in the lowland between the Cambrian Mountains to the west, the Pennines to the east and the Shropshire Hills to the south. Most of the parish is between 80 and 90 metres above sea level, with the highest land (125 metres) at Tedsmore. The land is mostly fertile although there are several marshy areas, usually denoted by the use of "moor" – Felton Moor, Aston Moor, Baggy Moor, etc. The only water-course of note running through the parish is the Weir Brook, although the River Perry forms the parish boundary to the north, and the Montgomery branch of the Shropshire Union canal forms the boundary to the west. The village is six miles south-east of Oswestry, which is the administrative centre for the Borough (District Council) to which West Felton belongs. It is thirteen miles to the north-west of the county town of Shrewsbury

Housing: farm houses, cottages, local hostelries along the A5, large wealthy estates, The Grange (Orange House), The Nursery (Dovaston), Pradoe, Tedsmore and Woodhouse with attached workers homes. Of later years sporadic development; two council estates and, much more recently, two large housing estates and infill.

People: the population of the Parish at the time of the 2001 census was 1380 the major proportion of that population living in the village of West Felton, others in and around the hamlets of Grimpo, Haughton, Weirbrook, Queens Head, Rednal, Henparks, Henbarns, Sandford and Tedsmore.

Children of primary school age have the opportunity to attend West Felton Church of England School. Secondary school children attend either The Corbett at Baschurch or The Marches in Oswestry. Walford and North Shropshire, Shrewsbury Sixth Form and Shrewsbury College provide further education. There are also private schools locally which take children from a very young age through to sixth form.

Although the main occupation was agriculture and most of the land is still farmed, a small industrial estate at Rednal also provides jobs for local people and improved road access makes it possible for people to travel to work to Oswestry, Shrewsbury, Telford and further afield. A small number of people work from home; broadband is available in West Felton. The survey responses received indicate that approximately 38% of the population are 50+ so people also come to West Felton to retire.

Current Resources:

Pre-School for young children 2-4 years

West Felton Primary School attended by approximately 80. The school has hard and grassed playing areas.

A shop / post office which is open for long hours

A Village Hall / Community Centre on the Holyhead Road and smaller halls attached to St Michael's and The Methodist Chapel.

A large playing field, owned by Trustees, but made available to the Parish and maintained by the Parish Council; contained within this site is a selection of play / adventure equipment for young children

Churches: Church of England St Michael's in the village, Haughton and Pradoe, The Methodist Chapel and Weirbrook United Reformed Church

The Punch Bowl Public House and The Queens Head Restaurant

Small industrial facilities

Milk round

Two phone boxes

Environment – the Parish Council is responsible for maintaining the playing field, churchyard, new burial ground, layby and small area of common land known as Flaxpool. Care is taken always to introduce native trees and hedging. The burial ground has an established native hedge planted. Trees planted on the layby are maturing – and we are proud of our two very distinctive trees: The Dovaston Yew and the beautiful copper beech that spans the old A5.

The Montgomery Canal runs through Queens Head and has been developed in recent years by British Waterways and Canal Volunteers. Many families take the opportunity to walk the canal footpaths and enjoy the flora and fauna that has been encouraged to colonise the area. Shropshire County Council has opened up footpaths in the parish; installed new stiles and fences where appropriate and encourage an ongoing interest in access to the countryside.

The following is analysed from the results of the questionnaire and reflect the statistics and views of those people that filled in the questionnaire.

The Parish Plan questionnaire produced 223 responses against 642 produced. 172 of these were from the main village with 40 from the surrounding hamlets. Overall this is a 34% response - very good for this type of survey. The following responses represent the views of the people who completed the survey.

Section 1 – Village life

The high number who have lived in the village for 5 years or less reflect the number of new houses built in recent times and the nature of modern employment. People are far more mobile but over 90 respondents (43%) have lived in West Felton for more than 10 years, proving that West Felton is a place that people want to spend their lives in.

The vast majority of respondents feel part of the community and intend to continue living in the parish. (Yes 178 / No 35). People plan to live in the village long term. 188 people plan to be living here in five years – but 26 said not.


What would you like to see happen to improve living here?


For things to continue the way they are, no more housing, speed limits, cleaner environment, better shop, people taking part in village life rather than just commuting, dog fouling signs, less litter, more trees, reduce property development, tidy up recycling area, tidy up untidy frontages, children taught to put rubbish in bins, better police presence, drop in lunch club, mother and toddler activities, Hicksons Lane to be better maintained, improvements to school building, drainage improved, public transport to Gobowen – would use trains more often, protection of open spaces

4 respondents use motorbikes. 37 use their bikes for between one and ten journeys per week including a high proportion of children. Dial-a-ride seems not to be used except by one respondent. Very few use trains or taxis but 37 use the bus service weekly with 10 using it monthly. 125 said they seldom use the bus.

Are there any members of your family who have moved away and would like to return if suitable housing were available – **190 said no but 9 said yes.**

Are there any members of your household presently living with you who would wish to live in their own accommodation if it were available? **178 said no, 15 said yes**.

Conclusions: Overall people would like to see affordable housing for local people but not more than 20 houses in total. There is also obviously a need for elderly (semi-sheltered) housing.

Comments: already had extensive building – please retain village atmosphere, no more large estates, we will have no wildlife left or greenery for future generations, housing prices have been pushed out of the price range of ordinary working people in favour of the town people looking for country idyll, very few places left in the village to build new houses, people need gardens with houses, village boundary should not be crossed, need affordable housing but not too many, sheltered housing for elderly, no facilities to sustain larger community, new people have brought in new ideas but there must be an optimum size, enough houses built in the last twelve years.

The relevant planning authorities should consider prioritising changing demand, particularly for affordable housing and bungalows within their future plans, but at the same time acknowledge people's concerns about the size of the village. West Felton has had several large estates in recent years and Oswestry Borough Council acknowledge this in their Newsletter "Osplan" Issue 3, November 2004 – Key Issue Consultation where it says "that villages such as West Felton have witnessed more than sufficient development over the last few years and reached their 'environmental capacity'. They should be given some 'breathing space'."

Comments: cheeky kids whose parents are unapproachable, vandalism to cars, car damage, tools stolen from shed, parking outside post office, regular speeding offenders. Establish friendly relations between police and local children; children who know and like their local bobby are more likely to grow into youths who will respect him/her, bored children form gangs, concern for safety and property. In the months of living in The Avenue only seen a police officer once. Very little crime, parking in School Road very dangerous for drivers and pedestrians

Having a village PC is useful but I feel his beat is too large and you cannot get hold of him easily. The police are very ineffective dealing with noise, public disorder, damage, youngsters drug taking in the village. Trouble in this estate has escalated and we have had enough, every week there is trouble. Please do something before something serious happens. Regular meeting with police so people can drop in and discuss local problems would be a good idea. Think PC Dale does a good job with the resources available to him, verbal abuse needs sorting out, get to know people like the old days.

I think if the community police officer could have a weekly surgery, say in the village hall, where people could speak about their concerns and also pass on information about what they have seen, we may find a drop in crime and have more confidence in our police service

Speeding and illegal parking also featured in other parts of this survey. Approach the Police Authority with a view to a regular Surgery in the Village Hall. This could form good relationships between all levels of community. Neighbourhood Watch should be encouraged.
